THE FUTURE OF MUSEUMS: RECOVER AND REIMAGINE AT NATIONAL MUSEUM OF INDONESIA

The National Museum of Indonesia provides information on the history of Indonesian nation and keeps the cultural heritage of varied ethnic groups living in Indonesian archipelago. Currently, the National Museum of Indonesia has been in the form of a Public Service Agency on March 22, 2021. The Covid-19 pandemic has made a change in the work paradigm of museums. The museum works on various activities and services in digital form. The National Museum of Indonesia recover and reimagine the future post pandemic era by improving the quality of providing digital-based services provision. The Covid-19 pandemic has made the National Museum of Indonesia to take steps to utilize technology so that the museum can continue to live and publish the information they have. The National Museum of Indonesia will attract interest and provide inspiration, especially for current and future generations. The National Museum of Indonesia has provisions regarding the adaptation of new habits that are applied to museum workers and visitors. The provisions for Adaptation of New Habits have been implemented by the National Museum of Indonesia since 2020, when the Covid-19 pandemic began in Indonesia. According to Jeong Ok Jeon, museum will be ready for its resilient future in the post-pandemic era among others, with digital activation and open (re) sources; a) Digital Activation: strengthens relations and interactions with the public. The public programs of the National Museum of Indonesia carried out with digital activation are 360 Virtual Exhibition Tour, Webinar, Museum Quiz Competition, Traditional Dance Class, Art and Cultural Skills Workshop, radio drama, Wayang Golek performance, Socialization of the National Museum of Indonesia and b) Open (Re) source allow museum to pursue more flexible in its structure and collaborative in its working models. The National Museum of Indonesia programs with open (Re) sources are Google Arts and Culture, and Virtual Exhibition.

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THE POTENTIAL OF SMALL MUSEUMS TO BE THE FUTURE MUSEUMS

University museums are small museums that still need to be developed in their potential. University museums in Malaysia fall in the category of small museums when viewed from aspects of collection development, funding, function and their role in the university as well as their core policy which are still unstable. When the pandemic of Covid 19 hit the world, the challenges in their functions are enormous. Therefore, a number of alternative strategies need to be made so that these museums would always remain relevant. The funding challenge to acquire artifacts or specimens needs to be given primary attention. Museums need to take steps to whiten their data, to complete the narratives, to increase references and aggressively increase the outflow of info and narratives of artifacts and specimens. Future museums need to provide a digital platform of their collections. Data platforms, images and target users need to be improved. University museum professionals need to leverage the expertise available at their respective universities by collaborating, obtaining research grants and leveraging students in turning collections into flip learning materials. Museums also enhance archival activities and link their findings to various levels as a common knowledge base. Art museums and galleries can no longer be highlighted from the aspect of history or the study of art alone, instead it is necessary to intensify the study of the humanities, scientific studies, economics and mathematics. Museums are already need to be seen and play an active role in developing human capital as well as driving interdisciplinary -based knowledge.

ARTEFACTS AND DIGITAL EXPERIENCE AT THE BORNEO CULTURES MUSEUM

This is to ensure that the combined displays will give visitors an enriching experience and provide new and exciting perspectives on the Sarawak Museum's collections.

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INFO-FORUM MUSEUM AND POSSIBILITY OF DIGITALIZED DATABASE PROJECT

National Museum of Ethnology (Minpaku) in Osaka, Japan is currently the world largest museum of Ethnology as containing over 340,000 collections all over the world including over 3,000 collections from Malaysia. The museum is also the largest research institution of Anthropology with over 50 permanent scholars (both Anthropologist and Archaeologist or related study area) in Japan. In this presentation, I would like to introduce our Info-Forum Museum project which aims to share our museum collections and related data as intangible information and practices as a "cultural resources of the world," and to ensure that it is passed on to future generations. There are several 3-4 years projects have been conducted under this Info-Forum Museum project, and this presentation introduce one of the project titled "Maritime Adaptation and Material Culture in Maritime Asia-Based on the museum materials from Southeast Asia" headed by the presenter since 2019 to discuss the future and importance of digitalized collection data base accessible from over the world and potential tools for exchanging our knowledge and idea.
